

At that time, we will be able to share the test results with parents and determine actual academic growth for each student.

All of our fall teams did remarkably well and we are very proud of our students and parents' commitment and dedication to Cross Country, Volleyball and Soccer. Our athletes improved their personal bests, learned new skills and had a great time of camaraderie with their team mates. 
A Little About our Teachers: Featuring the Kindergarten Team

Field Trip of the Month: Pre-K Students Enjoy the Kinsley Family Farm



With a clear blue sky and fall in bloom, the Pre-K students headed out for a memorable visit to the Kinsley Family Farm in North Georgia. The family operated working farm is known for beautiful pumpkin patches and Christmas trees that can be self cut. The students celebrated the fall harvest and enjoyed a variety of farm activities. The children took a hayride throughout the farm, fed the huge catfish and trout in the pond, fed the goats, and listened to a Halloween story. To top it off, everyone joined forces in planting a tree which includ-

ed digging the hole to watering it upon completion. Kinsey Farms is a beautiful setting and helped get everyone in the mood for fall and Halloween. Our old fashioned picnic on the farm grounds made the day one we will always remember!

Classroom Spotlight: Middle Grades Science



The middle grades students have been having a great time exploring science in the first nine weeks. Ms. Rebecca has brought hands on activities into the classroom to help illustrate the science concepts in each grade level.

The 5th grade has been studying the classification system. We have a great collection of biology specimens in the classroom and students have been able to get an up-close look at the characteristics of the animals they are studying. Students started each class period with a new set of specimens and had to determine what they had in common before exploring the new Phylum of the day.

The 6th graders have been studying rocks, minerals, soil and weathering. The 6th grade has made their own sedimentary rocks in class from glue and dirt in order to see the layers of soil in the rock. They also collected soil samples from their homes. Once the soil samples were brought into the classroom, students used a characteristics key and different activities to identify the type of soil that was in their yard.

The 7th graders have been studying biomes and ecosystems. While a field trip to the savanna is a tall order, students each picked a biome to research and created murals based on their findings. Their wonderful murals are hanging outside the science room for all to learn from.

The 8th graders have been studying energy and forces. They had a great time with their centripetal force lab. Students took a bucket of water outside to the sport court and spun it in a circle at varying speeds. Depending on the speed and the gravitational and centripetal forces, the water never left the bucket!

It has been an exciting nine weeks in middle grades science. Students are looking forward to learning new concepts through engaging activities next quarter.
