

#### 4th Graders Learn About the First Americans



In 4th grade this month, the SUNS and the HEROES learned about 6 Native American tribes; the Inuits, the Kwakiutl, the Pawnee, the Hopi, the Seminole, and the Nez Perce. Research of each of the tribes provided fascinating information that the 4th graders were eager to use in their in-class projects.

In the SUNS class, after learning about each tribes territory, how they obtained food, type of clothing, and shelter, the students designed different shelters that represented the Native Americans. Students worked in groups and brought in materials needed to create a replica of an igloo, plank house, longhouse, chickee, teepee, dome-shaped home, and a pueblo. They also created Native American dolls. All of their materials were brought from home or collected from outside around school or home. We tried to be as resourceful as the Native Americans were by using what we already had when building our projects.

The 4th grade HEROES created a lot of hands on activities based upon various Native American tribes. Students designed and engineered their own tepee complete with Native American symbols used by the Indians of the

Great Plains and some heroic symbols too! They also researched totem poles of the Kwakiutl tribe and how each part of the huge construction told a story about their family. They created a totem pole for our class by using some common symbols used by the Kwakiutl tribe and some of our own, too. The HEROES concluded their unit on the Native Americans by creating dioramas of their chosen Native American tribe which included their shelters, how they produced/caught their food, and their environment in which they lived in.

The students learned a great deal about Native Americans and their different cultures while learning to collaborate and have fun in the process.



#### Red Ríbbon Week: Respect Yourself, Be Drug Free!



We kicked off Red Ribbon Week with a balloon launch led by our Student Council at last Friday's Pep Rally. As a school, we set aside a week each year to honor the lives of men and women who have fought to curb the use of drugs in our community and to focus on the dangers of drugs.

This year, students were taught that a drug is a substance you put in your body that changes the way it works. We discussed how medicines, when taken proper-

ly, are good drugs and that there are also drugs that are bad for your body. We also discussed what some of those drugs are and looked at the importance of staying away from them.

In addition to learning about drugs and their effect on the body, student council planned some very fun activities



for the students. All activities centered around our theme, "Respect Yourself, Be Drug Free!" There were theme days including, Being Drug Free is Our Superpower and I Dream of a World that is Drug Free.

Students also enjoyed a decorating contest where they made a mural to show their commitment to being drug free. There were two winners in each age group, PK and Kindergarten, First through Third, and Fourth through Eighth.

Teachers also wrote paragraphs about how they stayed drug free. Students then

used the clues in the paragraphs to guess the teacher who had written them. Classes worked together to make their guesses in PK through 4th, but individual students guesses in grades 5 through 8. The class or student with the most correct answers earned a prize as well.

Overall, Red Ribbon Week was a lot of fun for all of our students with many surprises being awarded. Most importantly, our students learned to be safe in the world they live in.

mends that all children, over the age of 6 months, receive a Flu Vaccine to minimize contracting it and to minimize its symptoms should you contract it.
