

STEM and Robotics



The STEM program at McGinnis Woods is theme based, developmentally and age appropriate, hands on and unique. It is also proven to inspire students to consider STEM related career fields in the future. Laura Ascione, Managing Editor, Content Services at eSchool Media recently wrote, "Research indicates that early exposure to STEM courses helps students stick with these studies even as the material becomes more challenging in high school and college". This is why STEM instruction is a curriculum priority at McGinnis Woods. All students in PreK 4-8th grade spend time working with Mr. Alex, our STEM teacher, either weekly or quarterly. This is in addition to the many STEM activities which occur each week with their teachers.

During the month of August, our STEM classes focused on creating engineering structures of paper, plastic, and popsicle sticks. Students spent class time designing, building, and destroying towers/bridges/structures.

In September, we learned about liquids, the environment and weather. The lessons included such fun activities as making water-cycle-bags, creating slime, and generating our own whirlpools. During this time period we also discussed current events including Hurricane Florence and Typhoon Mangkhut. Our next unit will focus on the physics of light and sound. Some of the activities which will be explored include ultraviolet lights, efficiency of light bulbs, frequencies and color spectrums.

September's Word of the Month: Initiative



Seeing what needs to be done and doing it seems like a fairly easy concept to master, but honestly, even many adults struggle with this concept. During September, we discussed on the morning announcements how important it is to solve every day problems by taking initiative.

Some of the ideas we discussed during the broadcasts were: picking up trash if we saw it, even if it didn't belong to us and starting on homework right away. During the school days, we recognized students for helping others without being asked and including students who were being left out before being asked to do so. We encouraged everyone to be willing to do more than is asked of them and always be prepared to help. If everyone would take the initiative to adopt this great character trait, the world would be a kinder and more efficient place!

MaxScholar & Learning Ally Make a Difference

Ms. Kristen Craig is the Learning Support Teacher at McGinnis Woods. She works closely with the classroom teachers to determine the students who would benefit from additional academic support. Kristen works with the students in a variety of groupings including one to one and in small groups in order to achieve their goals and close the learning gaps. The students in Ms. Kristen's class use a variety of apps and programs during her class and have been particularly busy working with our specialized reading program called MaxScholar.

MaxScholar is an interactive, comprehensive, multi-sensory, and language-based reading program. The entire program uses an Orton-Gillingham approach to learning which is why it is so effective. MaxScholar has three main components: MaxPhonics, MaxReading, and MaxWords. In MaxPhonics, the students learn consonants, vowels, blends, and digraphs using various visual, auditory and tactile drills. In MaxReading, the students highlight, summarize and outline the text they read. In MaxWords, the students learn syllabication, spelling rules, prefixes, suffixes and roots.

In class most of the students use Ms. Kristen's classroom ipads for their work. The older students set reading goals for themselves and enjoy special rewards when they are achieved. Ms. Kristen enjoys using MaxScholar with her students and has found it to be a great addition to her other lessons. One of the best aspects of MaxScholar is that the students can access the program at home or on a portable device which strengthens the school/home partnership which is so valued at McGinnis Woods.

In addition to MaxScholar, our academic enrichment program has also incorporated Learning Ally. Learning Ally is a national non-profit dedicated to helping students with print disabilities, including blindness, visual impairment and dyslexia. Learning Ally improves the way students learn both at home and in the classroom at McGinnis Woods. Ms. Kristen has found that Learning Ally helps students reach their learning objectives and encourages a love of life long reading. The program allows students to listen to books read aloud while the text is being highlighted. Students can also control the speed at which the books are read to them. Not only does Learning Ally have books students enjoy reading, but it also has texts books available for them to listen to and understand better.





Keep Forsyth Beautiful Visit



Keep Forsyth Beautiful came to McGinnis Woods on September 18th to speak to our students about the Enviroscape, and how water and pollution can affect our environment. Through the use of a large interactive table top model, students learned how pollutants in storm water run-off affects water quality. Learning objectives covered included identifying pollutants and best management practices to minimize pollution.

Apryl, from Keep Forsyth Beautiful, explained and demonstrated to the students how small amounts of pollution can have large and lasting effects on our water supply. One

unique fact the students learned was that pollution that starts at the water source can be carried for many miles to our drinking supply and contaminate it.

It was a wonderful opportunity for our students to learn about science in creative way, while learning about their own community and the world around them. We look forward to seeing Apryl again in November when she returns to teach the students about Macroinvertebrates.



International Night Draws a Large Crowd

McGinnis Woods Country Day School hosted its 15th annual International Night on Tuesday, September 25. More than 300 people joined us for this unique celebration as we learned about the four featured countries of Italy, Mexico, Israel and Countries of the Caribbean.

4th Graders Navigate the Water of Lake Lanier



On Friday, September 21st, the 4th grade llamas travelled to Lake Lanier to investigate its water. The next unit in Science includes the water cycle and weather so the trip was a nice preview. Before embarking on the boat students were told a legend of Lake Lanier about how some Native American burial grounds might be lost below the surface. Students used binoculars to look for clues, as well as to search for animals, like the osprey, in their natural habitat. While on the boat the students worked in groups to test the water to make sure there wasn't too much soil in it, which could endanger many animals' eco-

systems, as well as harm our water supply. The 4th graders also fished for plankton and

observed the small creatures under microscopes, using pictures to try and identify the different types they caught. Our students were even given the chance to see some chemistry in action by seeing how chemicals can affect and treat our water! The day was capped with a relaxing picnic by the lake.



Did You Know?

One of the proud traditions we have at McGinnis Woods is that of our 2nd graders partnering with Canine Assistants as they train their dogs to help those in need of a therapy dog. This is the 7th year that we have worked with the K-9 Kids! Program.

The K-9 Kids! Program is a motivational reading program. Canine Assistants service dogs and representatives visit different schools throughout the metro Atlanta area each week during the school year to listen to the children read. Children who are uncomfortable reading in front of their peers for fear that they might make a mistake are quite at ease reading in front of a dog. Reading to dogs often gives children the confidence needed to overcome challenges in reading. This program benefits the dogs and the students and is a highlight of every week!

One of our favorite dogs is Borders. Borders has been visiting us for a few

years and has a calm, friendly demeanor. He loves our students and we look forward to his visits!



Wild Bots Robotics Team




The McGinnis Woods Robotics Team, "The Wild Bots" have been hard at work setting up and preparing for our FIRST LEGO League (FLL) competition. The theme this year is *Into Orbit* and we, along with 100s of other teams, are working toward answering this question:

What does it take to live on a space station or travel to another planet? Can you and your team create the critical innovation that will get earthlings

to Mars?

The missions are designed with critical thinking, innovation and teamwork in mind. During each robotics session team members program our robot

to solve problems such as adjusting solar panels, using 3D printers, safely deploying a lander, and more. They also practice running missions, spend time researching and preparing for their short competition presentation which highlights their space innovation and have fun!



Spanish Education at McGinnis Woods



Have you ever wondered why McGinnis Woods values teaching our students another language? We asked Ms. Monica Velez, our Spanish teacher, this very questions and this is what she shared about the topic.

Much research has been conducted throughout the years which supports the impact of learning a second language. The importance of learning a second language is not merely limited to the ability of communicating with people who speak different languages. Studies show that learning a second language results in students achieving greater levels of divergent thinking, creativity, and cognitive development compared to monolingual children. A number of studies have also shown that when students learn a second language they have a tendency of outscoring those who are proficient in only a single language on tests of nonverbal and verbal intelligence.

Experts agree that foreign language learning can give kids a leg up in many areas of their lives, with benefits ranging from academic achievement and carrier suc-

cess to better interpersonal relationships. Research also supports the fact that they become better thinkers, learners, and citizens of the world.

Language is one of the main components of the civilization and culture of the people who speak it. Hence, learning a second language can be a comparatively easy and wonderful way of absorbing another culture. It also enables us to comprehend what role language plays in shaping our thought patterns. Often, other languages have better methods of expressing ideas, concepts, or thoughts compared to English, thus enabling speakers to communicate better even in their own language!


of bullying and, of course, drug free.

DeSoto Caverns located in Childersburg, Alabama was the first cavern recognized in the United States as early as 1796. The cave was, however, recognized before that by explorer Hernando de Soto and his expedition in 1540 which also marked the beginning of European recorded history in Alabama. Since that time the cave has been used by indigenous people including the Coosa Indians, has been mined for various rich minerals and was even used as a speakeasy and dance hall during prohibition. The cavern is 60 degrees year round!
