


Preschool Corner

Trick or Treating Safety Tips written by Ms. Laura



It's nearly that time of the year again for the annual quid-pro-quo tradition of handing out candy to children under threat of mischief. While many of you probably have Halloween safety down to an art, some of the finer points bear repeating. While you should always check your children's candy for tampering before allowing them to gorge themselves into a chocolate coma, there are actually no reported cases in history of some madman tampering with stranger's candy on Halloween. Nearly all of the frightening stories spread during the '80s and '90s regarding this threat have since been debunked as fabrications and unverified urban legends. So, while it is still important to go through your child's candy bag and discard anything that isn't commercially wrapped and untampered with - unless it's from a close family friend you trust completely – far and away the most important safety tips surround *road safety*.

Children are more than twice as likely to be hit and killed by a car on Halloween than on any other day of the year, and most of these accidents will involve alcohol. There are many reasons for this including the number of adult parties serving alcohol and the subsequent vehicular irresponsibility, the excitement of trick-or-treaters who tend to dart into the roads or move in other unpredictable ways, and most parents don't send their children out of the house with either flashlights or reflective tape, making them difficult for drivers to spot. For adult drivers this means using an overabundance of caution:

Drive slowly and vigilantly

Do NOT text and drive

Make sure your headlights are turned on earlier in the day

Do NOT drink and drive – use ride services like Uber if you have been drinking

There are also several measures to teach your child to ensure their safety during this enjoyable but potentially dangerous holiday.

Make sure to arm your children and their friends with flashlights, glow sticks, and reflective tape not only on their costumes, but also their treat bags.

Teach your children to keep their flashlights pointed down so as not to accidentally blind oncoming drivers.

If possible, make sure your child's Halloween costume is a light color, and ensure that any masks fit well and don't obstruct their vision. It's also important to ensure their costumes are not so long or cumbersome as to trip them.

When possible, walk on the sidewalks. If you must walk in the roadway, walk in the left lane as far left as possible, so you can see oncoming vehicles. This is a good rule of thumb for the other 364 days a year as well.

When crossing the street always look both ways twice and make sure to only cross at crosswalks. One of the most dangerous things you can do is to cross the street between two parked cars.

It's always good practice, on Halloween as well as every other day of the year to make eye-contact with drivers before crossing in front of their vehicle. You can't trust that every driver is going to be as alert and undistracted as they should.

When accompanying children trick-or-treating, resist the temptation to scroll through your smart phone for texting, social media etc. Not keeping your eyes glued to your children and the roadway can have fatal consequences.

As a rule of thumb, most experts recommend chaperoning all children under the age of 12. Personally, I believe it should be 13, but if you feel your child is mature enough to trick-or-treat without adult supervision, it is best to ensure they do it with a group of friends. Also, if they have a smart phone, ensure that it is fully charged, their GPS is turned on and the family has location sharing apps installed. "Life360" and "Find Friends" available on the iPhone app store are good options for keeping track of your family. In the event your child is old enough to trick-or-treat unsupervised, but doesn't have a smart phone, you can buy GPS trackers either on Amazon or at Best Buy. Shockingly, 12% of children younger than 6 years old are allowed to trick-or-treat alone.

While these are the most important safety rules, don't forget about checking you children's candy if they have any allergies. I would also recommend restricting any teenage drivers' privileges on Halloween Night. If your teenagers need to go somewhere, it would be much safer for a responsible adult to drop them off and pick them up. If you follow these pieces of advice, the chance of a serious accident happening will be vastly diminished. Please be safe out there, and Happy Halloween!

Keep Forsyth County Beautiful Visit

keep all of the students actively engaged. Many of the students simulated the process that a stream would go through from being a pristine animal habitat to a polluted environment complete with toxic runoff and trash

pollutants downstream. Our 2nd graders used the enviroscape to explore water runoff in communities. The students were reminded just how important it is for us to protect our natural resources and to do our part to clean up trash and always dispose of it properly.

We are looking forward to our future visits with Ms. Apryl, as we work with KFCB to educate our students to be great stewards of our world.



The Chicks Are Back....




Chirp, Chirp? What's that sound? It is soon to be the sound of our sweet baby chicks that will be hatching in our Third Grade classroom!

Third grade's living STEM project involves incubating chicken eggs, fourteen beautifully colored eggs to be exact. The students have been researching the unique breeds of eggs which we are hatching. The types of eggs include: Easter Eggers, Sweet Blue Egg Layer, Fun and Funky, D.A. Uphorn of Worcester, Marans, Salmon Chickens, Buff Orpington, and Cochins. During this process students are learning about the life cycle of a chicken, and the process

that it requires to incubate the eggs and how they require the perfect humidity and temperature in order to hatch.

A fun fact about chicken eggs is they only require 21 days of incubation before they begin hatching. We are anticipating our eggs to hatch on or near October 8th. Once this happens, the students will be in charge of caring for the new chicks by providing them with food, water and making sure the heat lamps maintain a constant warm temperature.

Stay tuned for more updates as we prepare for the chicks' arrivals. We will have a live webcam available for you to view their progress. We can't wait to meet our new chicks and see what they will look like!

STEM and Technology in the Middles School



STEM and Technology are becoming important areas of our society and the teachers and students in the middle school use a variety of technology each day.

STEM and technology are not just used in math, science or computer labs these days. Some examples of how our students use technology are through Quizlet and Kahoot. These programs provide opportunities for our students to review classroom content as an individual activity or fast paced, competitive game. Students have also used Padlet, an interactive, online "bulletin board" for read and respond questions. With Padlet students can read and respond online in real time and

even respond and critique work of their class mates. Plickers has become a fun alternative for quick quizzing and review. Students have an assigned Plicker card that is held up to respond to multiple choice questions while a teacher scans the room with a smartphone or tablet. Plicker allows for instant grading and feedback of review questions.

STEM activities also take place on a weekly basis throughout the middle school. Everything from designing a planned neighborhood to engineering architectural structures and historic marvels like columns, domes, and the Great Pyramids are common activities which require teamwork, problem solving and analytical skills in order to succeed!

Parents' Night Out took place on Friday, September 27th. Ms. Wendy and Ms. Jenn, as well as staff in the preschool, had many students in their care while their parents enjoyed some time away without their sweet children.

Be on the lookout for the next Parents Night Out which will take place in either November or early December.






Student Council Officers Elected




















Jr. Beta Club has Big Plans!


Project Showcase is on the Way

3rd Annual Tech Fair is Coming Soon



It's time for the 3rd Annual McGinnis Woods Technology Fair! Once again, 5th through 8th graders will be able to show off their tech skills and express their "techie" side by creating videos, coding, making their own website, or even designing a robot. For the middle school, Technology Fair replaces Project Showcase, and it provides an opportunity for students to be as creative as they want to be by using a variety of technological elements. Students will choose from 1 of 9 categories: 3D Modeling, Animation, Audio Production, Digital Photo Production, Graphic Design, Multimedia Applications, Project Programming, Robotics, and Video Production.
